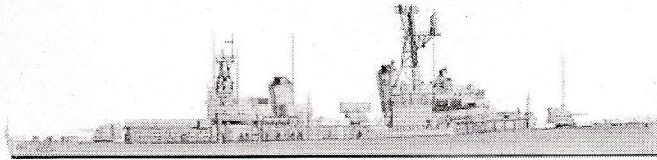




USS Johnston (DD821)

The final plans for the 2007 USS Johnston DD-821 Las Vegas reunion have been completed. The dates for our reunion will be from Thursday May 3, 2007, and ending Monday May 7, 2007. As many of you will remember, the Republic of China Navy acquired our ship after she was retired from our Navy; and the ship served in their Navy until a few years ago. As a gift of friendship they sent us a brass porthole from our ship with an engraved plaque as a good will gesture and keepsake so that we will always have a part of the old girl. They have received our gift, and I received a letter of thanks from them as well. They have indicated that if you go to their web site they have posted a picture of our gift. I'm sure many of you are as interested in keeping track of the final disposition of our ship as I am. She is still sitting at anchor in Taiwan awaiting her final fate to be used as a target ship. I sent a letter to the Republic of China Naval Headquarters asking if they would allow a delegation from our association to be present at her sinking or would they consider sending us a video of her final voyage. I was honored to receive a letter sent to our association from Admiral Lin, Commander in Chief of the Republic of China Navy. He indicated that our ship had a glorious history in both our Navies and she is being prepared to be used as a target ship in a future military exercise. He also indicated that they will provide us with a video when the ship is finally sunk as a valuable historical record to be shown at our reunions. His thoughtfulness and that of the Chen Yang DDG-928 Association makes me ever aware that a sailor's love for his ship bridges more than just our Navy alone, but all Navies and all who have served on the high seas.
