


Ralph Hocking is in charge

USS Johnston DD-557 Survivor Bob Hollenbaugh Speaks at DD-821 Reunion

The Welcome Banquet at our 2010 Reunion was highlighted by the visit of Bob Hollenbaugh, one of the survivors of the USS JOHNSTON DD-557. A resident of San Diego, the 89-year old with the firm handshake graciously accepted our invitation to attend the banquet. Association President Bob Nava provided the transportation for our special guest.

A member of an Amish family in Indiana, Hollenbaugh enlisted in the Navy prior to World War II. Following his discharge after some five years and five months of service to his country, Bob attended college in Michigan and then taught high-school mathematics in San Diego. Retirement in 1984 led to the purchase of a motorhome, which allowed Bob and his wife to enjoy traveling before settling down for seven years in Coos Bay, Oregon. The Hollenbaughs subsequently returned to San Diego. Sadly, Bob's wife passed away several years ago.

One-time Electrician's Mate First-Class Hollenbaugh shared with us some of his recollections of the Battle of Leyte Gulf and the harrowing three days he'd spent in the water as a result of the sinking of the DD-557 during that battle. His words served to once again remind us of those who are, and were, the Greatest Generation. May we never forget the debt we owe to those who sacrificed so much; those who are leaving us at the rate of some 1200 per day.
