If you have to make a choice of one, please pick the regular reunion in Charleston.

Boston Reunion Review

THE DESTINATION IS "BAHSTON"

Both George and I had been to Boston over 20 years ago but we did not have the opportunity to see all the sites. So when Boston was chosen for the 25th annual U.S.S. Johnston DD-821 reunion, we made a list of attractions and venues we wanted to visit. This historic city is on the U.S. News and World Report magazine's list of top U.S. destinations. It has a lot to offer whether your passion is baseball, the arts, fashion, food, history and many other interests. Our board of directors chose the Holiday Inn Boston-Dedham for its location and affordability. As most of you know, you can blow through your entire travel budget easily in Boston if you are not careful.

We arrived the day before the reunion started so that we had time to prepare for the arrival of the shipmates and guests as well as have some additional free time to explore. The reunion started officially at 3 p.m. on Monday with the opening of the Hospitality Room. Monday morning, we gathered a group and took off by train to downtown Boston where we got the feel of the city with the huge buildings, the crowds and, unfortunately, no idea where we could find a good restaurant for lunch. The city can be intimidating. As it happened, we were stopped at a crosswalk and I managed to ask a young man standing next to us where he would recommend our group have lunch. He suggested the Slate Bar and Grill as a popular place with good food and gave us directions. We had a bit of a hike but finally found it and, as it turned out, it was worth the effort. On the return train trip, the group was given a free ride when the train operators saw all the U.S.S. Johnston hats. Boston is also a patriotic city!

The shipmates and guests started arriving at the Hospitality Room by early afternoon and by the time dinner time arrived, all were sharing experiences of the past year and welcoming new attendees. The Welcome Dinner was truly welcoming with an array of offerings, among them – New England clam chowder, fruit salad, antipasto salad, chicken marsala, sliced strip loin with Bordelaise sauce, and assorted desserts!

Tuesday, May 9th, all shipmates and guests were on board by 8:15 a.m. and headed for Battleship Cove which has the largest collection of World War II ships. Our driver, Vinnie, and our tour guide, Ron, were prepared to make the 45-minute ride as comfortable, informative, and entertaining as possible. Upon arriving at Battleship Cove, we went directly to our tour of the U.S.S. Joseph P. Kennedy DD -850 which is similar in size and configuration to the U.S.S. Johnston DD-821. I marveled how the young men assigned to such ships could maneuver around the small areas, especially their bunks stacked three high with three small compartments where all of their earthly possessions were stowed.

After our tour, we ate lunch on the U.S.S. Massachussets, a battleship that is also in Battleship Cove. Our next adventure was a totally different type of experience—a tour of the Lizzie Borden house. Prior to the tour, a number of the attendees expressed little interest. The comments after the tour, however, indicated they were totally absorbed with the story. It is no wonder. Our host at the Lizzie Borden house, was, obviously, very adept and knew the story well. As soon as we stepped inside the house, he took control of the story and we felt as if we were right in the middle of a murder mystery imagining a precise re-enactment of the murders. The upper floor of the house is used as a bed and breakfast. A night will cost you a few hundred dollars and you shouldn't be too afraid to book it. After all, Lizzie was never convicted!

Wednesday, May 10th, required another early morning start at 8:15 a.m. Our tour director, P.J., originally from Ireland and still holding on to slight accent, was well versed in American history. During our walking tour of Boston's historic district, he provided a lot of information on Paul Revere's house, the settlement of the area by different ethnic groups, the development of Boston by Josiah Quincy in the 1820's, and many other topics. A stop for refreshments and a cannoli at Mike's Pastry Shop on Hanover

Street was a welcome treat. It is one of the most famous pastry shops in Boston. We continued on the Freedom Trail where we saw Paul Revere's statue and St. Stephen's church where Rose Kennedy was both baptized and memorialized at the end of her life.

We were on our own for lunch at Quincy Market and had plenty of time to stop in Faneuil Hall, another great U.S. landmark. Our afternoon destination was Charlestown to tour the U.S.S. Constitution or "Old Ironsides" as it has been known since the War of 1812. The U.S.S. Johnston DD-821 reunion group was given special treatment on this tour. Captain Robert Gerosa, the 74th commanding officer of Old Ironsides, took time out of his duties to talk to our shipmates and guests. Additionally, another deck was opened for touring by our group exclusively. Anyone touring this amazing vessel is bound to feel the patriotism of the American heroes who served on it and the gratitude we owe to them.

Thursday's official activities did not start until mid-afternoon when the business meeting was held. As such, we had the morning and early afternoon to continue to explore the Boston area. As it happened, some of the shipmates had planned to tour the John F. Kennedy Library and Museum and invited us to go along.

Driving in the Boston area is not for the faint of heart but our navigator, Billy Cook, drove like a native Bostonian! There are 13 Presidential Libraries in the country and the J.F.K. Library is the only one located in New England. The Libraries are managed by the National Archives and Records Administration which was created by Franklin D. Roosevelt. All Presidents are required to surrender their records to the National Archives.



There is so much in this library and museum that it is overwhelming to consider being there for just a few hours. In addition to the 5 million pages of J.F.K.'s papers, Robert Kennedy's papers are also on site, along with the manuscripts of Ernest Hemingway and countless photographs, sound recordings, films, video tapes, and other printed materials. Having lived through the Kennedy years as a high school student, the memories of the 1960 campaign through November 22, 1963 all came back to life. This tour is one worth taking if you visit the Boston area.

By the time we finished the library and museum tour, we had worked up an appetite. Of course, the only place we wanted to go is "where everybody knows your name"—Cheers! Finding a parking place was a challenge but our driver, Billy, again came through. We enjoyed a delicious lunch with our friends and crossed off our list another Boston landmark. I managed to purloin a paper placemat and a cocktail napkin as souvenirs.

Our Farewell Dinner provided a final opportunity for the shipmates and guests to reminisce and socialize with new and old friends. The Missing Man Ceremony, along with prayers, always starts the event. This tribute to missing soldiers of foreign wars is always very solemn as everyone remembers the sacrifice these men made for our freedom.

There was something for everyone on the menu-minestrone soup, salad, Teriyaki steak tips, roasted pork, grilled salmon,

assorted starches and vegetables, and irresistible desserts. The White Elephant Auction is always a hit and the shipmates and guests can always count on taking home several items. Our time together had come to an end and the attendees shared last minute thoughts and said their goodbyes.

We hope to see you next year in Charleston, South Carolina when the Jolly J will have its 26th annual reunion of shipmates.

Secondly we would appreciate payment of the yearly dues if at all possible. We do understand that not all can afford to pay and that is OK. However at \$15/year, you have to admit it's a great deal. At the time of this writing, we have only **70** paying members for **2017** or beyond out of the **338** (about 20%) that are currently listed on our roster. All shipmates on the roster receive our newsletters and have been sent a dues payment form. The dues basically keep the Association afloat by not only paying for the printing of the newsletters but the cost of mailing them also. Dues also help to defray the costs of maintaining the USS Johnston website (www.ussjohnston.org). Now I don't know about you, but in my opinion, our website is second to none. You do the math, each mailing of the newsletter cost about \$300. One Hundred paying members equals \$1500. That barely covers the cost of three mailings and maintaining our website. Extra donations have been our saving grace. Some are now receiving the newsletter IN COLOR via email and that has helped lower our delivery costs. Keep in mind the dues are **NOT** tax deductible!
